The Traditional Towns



During the Edo period, Nakasendou was an important road way that connected the city Edo and Kyoto. Out of the 69 post stations, there were 11 inns in Kiso. Upon its first posting station, Narai Juku is divided into three city blocks: Ue-machi, Naka-machi, and Shita-machi. It is a tourist attraction that presents the colorful

emotions of Japan. There was no need to reserve in order to stay at an inn during the Edo period. Because of the sudden weather changes, the people were not sure whether they can make it or not. There were no phones or mails to make the reservations, either. The people just suddenly go up to the inns, and negotiate to stay, with the clerks. During the evening when people are looking for inns to stay, the chambermaids welcome them.

People who go across the road several times have fixed inns they go to, called "Jyou-yado". There are two ways for accommodating. The modern way of eating and paying for two meals. The other way is to buy the inn's firewood and bring your own rice to heat, and this way was called "Kichin-yado".

However, people with high statuses did not stay at ordinary inns. They stayed at the best post stations in the expensive inns, called "Hon-jin" (stronghold). These were very popular, so booking was necessary. For booking, letters called "Hikyaku" (express messenger) was used.



Off to a Journey

There were no baths in the post towns. People had to bathe in public baths nearby. They stayed in the inn rooms with different people, not only their families. There were no doors in the rooms, and so the sliding doors called "Fusuma" were the boundaries. If you opened "Fusuma", there were other customers. The Japanese unique manners made it safe for people to stay.
